SPOTLIGHT ON VOLUNTEERS: TRAINED & READY TO GO!

Liz Bolton and Lois Pastore were two of the five original committee members who founded the South Coastal Village Volunteers. They were so impressed with the Village concept, they offered to serve as Volunteer Coordinators. Pre-pandemic, they participated in the South Coastal Library's Volunteer Fair and attended meetings with the Lord Baltimore Women's Club, the Lord Baltimore Lions Club, church ministers and a number of home owner associations to spread the word about SCVV. You may have seen them at local grocery stores last summer and fall, handing out information about our Village. They have been instrumental in placing rack cards in many local businesses and offices as they continue to educate the public about what SCVV has to offer.

Our "dynamic duo" recruited volunteers from referrals from Survey Monkey and SCVV's

Steering Committee's personal networks, as well as responses to publicity via e-mails and phone calls.

Liz and Lois underwent extensive training by our host organization, Village Volunteers, so that they could train SCVV's volunteers. Each candidate has an interview, followed by two reference checks and a background check provided by a professional service.

Once volunteers are accepted, they receive both orientation and training. They become familiar with the history of the international Village movement. They are educated about membership – where members come from, membership costs and qualifications, and the member intake process.

They learn the "Dos" and "Don'ts" of working with older adults, guidelines for emergencies along with the types of services we provide.
